FRIENDLY 'BUDDIES' RECRUITED!



YEAR 7 GUIDE TO THE ACADEMY

We are very excited for our Year 6 students to join us in September and we are here to offer the best advice to help you in your first few weeks at Shotton Hall.

You have 25 lessons a week, each an hour long. There will be homework - but it helps you learn faster and teaches you to work independently - just make sure you keep on top of it!

There's plenty to learn, lots of teachers and some fantastic experiences to get stuck into. Staff are welcoming and very caring. You may get lost a few times at first, but don't worry, you will get the hang of it!

You will definitely need equipment to be successful. Pens, pencils, ruler and planner are essential, but if you love stationery, you might want to pop to WH Smith before September.

Don't forget you will need a backpack to carry all of

your supplies in!

Now then, uniform - this will be a bit different to your primary schools. You must wear: a black school blazer, a white shirt, black trousers or A-line black skirt, a tie (don't worry, it's clip on) and leather or leather look school shoes. There is a more detailed guide on the school website.

Also be careful with jewellery - you are allowed to wear earrings as long as it's only in the lower lobe and they are studs. You cannot wear any other accessories as they could get lost, stolen or broken so just leave it at home.

Lastly, mobile phones are not allowed! So make sure you don't have them out in class or at break and lunchtime.

We won this award for our high quality, impactful projects with other schools in Europe and our involvement in eTwinning events and training activities.
