We achieved our best ever GCSE results!

This summer, Year 11 students celebrated a fantastic set of GCSE results and the best attainment score our school has ever seen!

In the second year of more challenging GCSEs across the curriculum, students excelled in all subject areas with not only excellent grades, but by making excellent progress from their starting points, a key measure of success for all schools.

74% of students achieved a pass in both English and maths with an impressive 49% of these grades a strong pass living up to our school's excellent academic reputation.

Attainment 8, which measures students' average grade across eight subjects, was 53.3, very significantly above the national average.

Top performer was Nicole Blackwell with a bonanza of top grades. Her nine Grade 9s, the very top grade attributed to just a tiny percentage of passes, is one of, if not the, best set of results Shotton Hall has ever seen.

Achieving a terrific seven Grade 9s, was Charlie Horn.

Emily Dobson also did exceptionally well achieving six Grade 9s. Emily had been in and out of hospital in the lead up to the GCSEs and sat all her exams with a full back brace.

Alex Hook, our Head of School, said:

"One of the marks of an outstanding school is the ability to sustain excellence for pupils year on year. Every year we encourage our students to do their best and every year they deliver. They are a wonderful group of young people who have done their teachers proud and who continue the Shotton Hall custom of being one of the top performing secondary schools in the country.

"In total, 83 Grade 9s were awarded across the school - an impressive haul for our very capable young people - who now go on to their chosen sixth forms and colleges. We wish them all the very best of luck for their future endeavours!"

Student speaks up for deaf awareness!

Did you know that 1 in 6 people in the UK are affected by hearing loss which mostly goes unrecognised? Our brave Year 11 student, Emma Brown, shares her story...

"Since birth I have always struggled with hearing loss. I have had many sets of grommets and operations on my ears but nothing has quite seemed to work. Little did I know that my hearing loss was part of something bigger - I had to go to A&E just before Christmas last year and found out that I had a dysfunctional Eustachian tube which was mainly to blame for my hearing loss.

"I was offered hearing aids but my first reaction was to turn them down due to the idea that I may be bullied or laughed at for having plastic things in my ears. Instead, I chose to have an operation which was unsuccessful and caused me more pain than ever. A year later I was again given the

chance to have hearing aids and thankfully I said YES - I've never looked back since. Having hearing aids is one of the best things that's ever happened to me. I heard things for the first time, things I didn't even know had a sound.

"What I have learned is that it isn't my ears or hearing aids that define me. Being deaf is something to be proud of just like anything else. It has its perks - when someone gets on my nerves I can just turn my hearing aid off... Due to my hearing loss I decided to teach myself sign language and I'm able to share that with friends and family and use it at school, showing that a disability does not define you or stop you!"
