The power of words

As part of the development of our students' 'cultural capital', Year 7 and 8 students spent time looking at the impact that words can have on our sense of identity and in society.

The session consisted of students exploring the positive and negative impact of the language that they use. Students specifically looked at how the term 'grass' has such a negative impact on our school and the wider community.

Students focussed on the importance of not ridiculing those who tell the truth and why it is important to celebrate brave people who go against the crowd and stand up for what they believe in.



Reading mentors

A group of Year 11 students have volunteered to take on the role of 'reading mentors' for younger students. They meet in the library once a week to read with Year 7 and 8 students.

The younger students were given the opportunity to select their reading book from a range of options from the library. This is a great opportunity for older students to gain experience as mentors for younger students.

As well as building confidence in our older students, similarly, our Year 7 and 8 students have been given a great chance to improve their confidence and ability while enjoying reading in a new environment!

Study skills

Throughout this term, students from all year groups have been attending 'Study Skills' sessions with Mrs Scott and Miss Ingram in a bid to improve their knowledge of how to revise effectively and independently.

Students learned how our memory works and were given research-based theory on effective revision strategies such as dual coding, spacing and interleaving. They were also given practical ideas on revision tools with explanations on how to use them effectively; flashcards, mind maps, revision clocks, loci method are to name but a few.

Departments throughout the school and across the curriculum then spent time with students allowing them to have a go at making the revision materials for themselves. This came in particularly useful for our Year 11 students who were due to sit their mock exams shortly after receiving this session. Flashcards and revision clocks were seen in abundance around the school in the run up!

Here are a few tips that apply to all year groups to aid revision:

- Revise in a well-lit environment which is clutter free and quiet.
- Plan for revision considering a timetable and what you want to achieve.
- Allow some treat time for yourself as a reward for completing revision.

The 'Study Skills' session has also been delivered to parents on parents' evenings to allow adults at home to help students to prepare for exams and assessments at home, so if all else fails, speak to someone at home who may be able to give you some tips on how to revise best!

Budding artists...

The first term at The Academy at Shotton Hall has seen students bid for first place in a calendar art competition...

The competition involved students creating a piece of artwork based on one of the months of the year to form a calendar - we had a lot of fantastic entries.
